Access Guide to Maughold Church & Cross House

Manx National Heritage has the guardianship of many ancient monuments in the landscape.

A number of these sites are publicly accessible. We recognise that visiting the Island's

ancient monuments can present difficulties for people with disabilities. We have prepared

an access guide for visiting Maughold Church and Cross House to help you plan your visit.

This access guide does not contain personal opinions as to suitability for those with access

needs, but aims to accurately describe the environment at the site.

Introduction

Maughold Church and churchyard is a fascinating place to visit. It was the site of an early

Christian monastery (founded 500-600AD) and contains a number of important ancient

monuments. The stone wall that now surrounds the modern churchyard marks the area of

the monastery enclosure. There are four ancient keeills (chapels) in the churchyard, two of

which can clearly be seen (to the North and East of the churchyard).

Maughold Cross House within the churchyard contains a large collection of early Christian

and Viking carved stone crosses. The Isle of Man has more than 200 of these stone

memorials, which is the largest collection in the British Isles. There is also a large medieval

cross inside the church.

Getting to Maughold Church

Grid Reference: SC 4930 9169

By Car: Journey time from Douglas is approximately 40 minutes, or 10 minutes from

Ramsey. From either direction travel along the Laxey coast road (A2), and follow the

signposts for Maughold. Once on the Maughold road drive for approximately 3.5km to

reach the village. Park by the village green.

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By bus: There is a bus route (number 16) between Ramsey and Maughold Village. Please visit www.iombusandrail.im for more detailed information.

Access for Visitors

Visitor Facilities:

The site is open during daylight hours.

There are benches throughout the churchyard.

There is some written interpretation on the ancient monuments within the Church and Cross House. Further information can be found online. All the Island's stone crosses have been scanned in 3D and are available at www.imuseum.im. Use the search term 'Manx Crosses'.

There are wheel chair accessible public toilets in Maughold Village. The toilets also have baby changing facilities. It is approximately a 5 minute walk from the church.

Site Access:

Maughold Church and Cross House are accessible to visitors using wheel chairs, although the uneven paths mean assistance may be required. Much of the churchyard can also be explored.
