Spotter Sheet

Grey Seal



The most common seal in Manx waters, often seen hauled out on land or swimming/bobbing in the water, especially around Calf Sound.

Puffin



Seen from Mar-Aug, these colourful birds live at sea most of the time and only come to land to breed in grassy burrows. Chicks are called pufflings.

Manx Shearwater



Seen from Feb-Jul, this albatross relative may be seen gliding close to the sea surface. Named after the island and only breeds on the Calf.

Sea Urchin



A spiny relative of the starfish, which graze on algae. Several species are found from the lower rocky shore amongst rocks and seaweed.

Velvet Swimming Crab



The back legs are flattened for swimming. It has distinct red eyes and hair-covered, velvety legs. They are quite aggressive.

Mostly offshore.

Common Seal



Locally uncommon; they have a short head, blunt nose and a more cat-like appearance compared to grey seals. The Calf is the best place to see them.

Black-backed Gulls



Two species nest around coasts and cliffs. They have dark grey wings and back, with a red spot on the beak. The lesser has yellow legs, the great has pink legs.

Eider Duck



The male sea duck is black and white with a green patch behind the head. The female is browngrey. They feed on molluscs and crustaceans.

Razorbill



Nests on ledges and amongst rocks. It has a distinctive short, thick bill with a white line across their head. They pair for life. Seen April-September, often with guillemots.

Shag



Smaller than a cormorant, shags catch fish with their long hook-tipped bill. Adults have glossy green plumage whilst juveniles are brownish.
